Trustees' Report

The trustees present the annual report together with the financial statements of the Charity for the year ended 31 December 2016.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the charity are to advance education in all matters relating to the posture and wheeled mobility needs of people with disabilities, and the equipment and services those needs require.

The main activity undertaken in relation to the above purposes is the annual conference, which

provides a programme of proceedings and training

hosts a large industry exhibition of equipment

creates a strong networking environment for the sharing of knowledge amongst peers

offers a number of bursaries to enable newly qualified and new-to-the-field members to attend free of charge

The trustees have complied with their duty in section 17(5) of the 2011 Charities Act to have due regard to guidance published by the Charity Commission relating to public benefit.

Achievements and performance

In addition to the annual conference, there were two other PMG training/marketing events in 2016 – one at Naidex in April, and the other during the OT Show in November. Both of these, along with general marketing on social media, further boosted the group's profile.

The 2016 Conference was held in July at the International Convention Centre (ICC), Birmingham.

Because of the perceived threat to delegate numbers posed by the European Seating Symposium (ESS) moving dates from November to June, the group had approved additional spending on a high-quality venue, offering more space and with excellent national and international transport links. Partly as a consequence, plus the excellent programme, the number of attendees achieved was high – only 65 less than the record-breaking numbers at Leeds in 2015 – and the exhibition sold just 11.5sqm less space (the equivalent of a medium size stand). Feedback from those who attended was almost universally positive, with many hoping for a return to the ICC in future.

The number of bursaries awarded in the year was maintained, benefiting not only the recipients in the immediate term, but their clients in the long term, and the field generally.

Funds were also made available to complete the new website, which went live in February 2016 to much acclaim. The website includes an integrated booking system for delegates and exhibition stands, establishing greater administrative efficiency going forward.

Reserves continued to be made available to support the PMG research fund, with two new projects successful in their applications for funding in 2016.

The group continues to work in partnership with the National Wheelchair Managers' Forum on matters of common interest. In addition, in late 2016, discussions were held with Motivation about the World Health Organisation's Wheelchair Service Training Packages (WSTPs), and how these might be used in the UK. Work on the use of the WSTPs will be developed in 2017.

Trustees' Report

Structure, Governance and Management

The Posture and Mobility Group (PMG) is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) No. 1159774.

The trustees held a strategy meeting in April 2016, producing recommendations to change the committees' structure, with the aspiration to

save on spiralling meeting costs

improve communications and efficiency across the areas of common interest within the various committees

reduce administration load

The recommendations were approved at the Annual General Meeting on 20th July 2016, and the new committees' structure has been implemented.

Financial Review

In January 2015, the trustees agreed to formally ring fence £70,000.00 to meet the upfront costs of subsequent years' conferences in the eventuality of reduced income from conference activity. As mentioned above, 2016 had also been considered a risk year for the conference, because of the potential threat to attendance numbers from ESS being held in June.

Although achieving a surplus at the 2016 conference, this wasn't sufficient to cover the group's overall operational costs throughout the year. There were unforeseen liabilities, and other extenuating circumstances, which meant the surplus on the event was lower than projected:

- 1. New national exhibition Health & Safety regulations came into force in late 2015, and PMG employed outside expertise to manage these going forward.
- 2. There was no suitable university accommodation available in Birmingham to incorporate into conference attendance packages, and therefore a contract was signed with Travelodge to use rooms in 5 of their hotels local to the venue. Although based on typical room sales for a PMG conference, the uptake was relatively low, and we could negotiate to cancel only a proportion of the Travelodge rooms booked.
- 3. The lack of available parking on the Leeds University campus for the 2015 conference caused some negative feedback from exhibition companies and therefore, as a goodwill gesture, PMG elected to provide one free parking space per exhibiting company throughout the 2016 event (including 15 parking spaces at Barclaycard Arena for which PMG was charged separately).

Reserves were drawn upon to cover the operational costs of the group.

The remaining reserves continue to be available to progress PMG's aims and objectives, and to meet any unexpected contingency expenditure. The group currently has three instant access savings accounts - with Aldermore, Clydesdale and Santander banks - to help spread the reserves, and keep within the Financial Services Compensation limit of £75,000.00 per account at all times.

In 2016, PMG employed a new accountancy firm, Wortham Jaques, who specialise in working with charities, and are also based in Devon (local to the administrative office). On their recommendation, PMG has purchased accountancy software which will save time on finance tasks going forward, as well as providing effective reporting systems.

2017 could be a difficult year in the general financial world, with the uncertainty surrounding Brexit, but PMG remains in a good position to cope with this, despite the comparatively lower surplus realised by the 2016 conference.

Trustees' Report

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with the United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) and applicable law and regulations.

The law applicable to charities requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the applicable Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations, and the provisions of the constitution. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charity's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2016

1 Accounting policies

Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

Basis of preparation

The Posture and Mobility Group meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement

The Charity opted to early adopt Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016 and have therefore not included a cash flow statement in these financial statements.

Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

The trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the Charity to continue as a going concern. The trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of one year from the date of approval of the financial statements.

No such material uncertainties have been identified.

Income and endowments

Voluntary income including donations, gifts, legacies and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature is recognised when the Charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Donations and legacies

Donations and legacies are recognised on a receivable basis when receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Gift aid

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the Statement of Financial Activities at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

Investment income

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

Charitable activities

Income from charitable activities includes income recognised as earned (as the related goods or services are provided) under contract.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2016

Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources, with central staff costs allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use. Other support costs are allocated based on the spread of staff costs.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the Charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Grant expenditure

Grants payable are included in the SOFA when they have been authorised by the trustees and the commitment is included in the accounts as a creditor.

Grant provisions

Provisions for grants are made when the intention to make a grant has been communicated to the recipient but there is uncertainty about either the timing of the grant or the amount of grant payable.

Support costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, for example, allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

Governance costs

These include the costs attributable to the Charity's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including audit, strategic management and Trustee's meetings and reimbursed expenses.

Taxation

The Charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the Charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £100.00 or more are initially recorded at cost, less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:

The specific purposes for which the funds are to be applied are as follows:

Research Fund

The Research and Development Fund was set up in 2005 to support relevant research and development. Since the project was set up the group have approved research projects totalling £121,635 of which researchers have claimed £81,434. The trustees have taken the decision to take the value of authorised grants to the SOFA each year rather than the actual amount paid out, any unpaid grants are recorded as a creditor.

At the balance sheet date the Research Fund has uncommitted funds of £40,201 (2015: £36,228).

Contingency Reserve

The contingency was set up by the trustees to ring-fence an amount of money to ensure continuation of the stated charitable activities, even in the event of reduced income from conference activitiy.

The transfer of £5,817 from unrestricted funds to the Research Fund represents the total net increase in unpaid grants at the year end.
