# What can developments in the WHO Wheelchair Service Training Packages and the International Society of Wheelchair Professionals bring to the UK?

## **Summary**

The World Health Organization (WHO) has developed a comprehensive wheelchair service training package (WSTP), which can be modified to the context of delivery. What is the relevance of this package for the UK?

## **Background**

The WHO 'Guidelines on the provision of manual wheelchairs in less resourced settings' were published in 2008. The training packages are tools to turn this document into reality; designed to increase the capacity of personnel working in wheelchair provision. Training progression is based on clients' postural support needs. The basic level training package was launched in 2012; the intermediate in 2013; the managers and stakeholders in 2015. Piloting of the Training of Trainers module will be complete by October 2016.

The ISWP was formed in 2015 with the aim of developing a self-sustaining network of international and regional partners dedicated to the professionalisation of wheelchair services around the world.
