Enabling clients to remain free of pressure ulcers will contribute positively to their health and quality of life, and significantly reduce healthcare costs. This course offers participants the opportunity to advance their knowledge and clinical skills in pressure ulcer prevention and management within a context of evidence-based practice in order to promote effective clinical decision making.

Outline Programme

Days 1 & 2 24, 25 February 2012 Pressure ulcers pathophysiology, risk factors and clinical guidelines. Risk assessment, identification and documentation of pressure ulcers, and OT intervention.

Days 3 & 4 23, 24 March 2012 Heel pressure ulcers, pressure mapping and cushion evaluation, pressure ulcer management and multidisciplinary team working.



Pressure Ulcer Prevention & Management for Occupational Therapists

Introduction

This module gives clinicians the opportunity to enhance their clinical reasoning skills in the prevention and management of pressure ulcers. It addresses the impact of pressure ulcers on patients and on health service resources. Participants will have the opportunity to reflect critically on their everyday practice and obtain the clinical skills necessary to complete a high quality holisitic assessment of contributory factors and competently undertake a range of evidence-based intervention strategies to reduce the impact of pressure ulceration on the client.

Who should attend?

This course is primarily for occupational therapists involved in the rehabilitation of clients at risk of developing pressure ulcers.

Course Content

Days 1&2 – Pressure ulcers pathophysiology, risk factors and clinical guidelines. Risk assessment, identification and documentation of pressure ulcers, OT intervention.

Days 3&4 – Heel pressure ulcers, pressure mapping and cushions, managing pressure ulcers, multidisciplinary team working and case studies.

Speaker Biographies

Dr Michael Clarke PhD, BSc (Hons) Zoology

Michael has extensive experience in the areas of pressure ulcer prevention and wound healing. He is currently an independent consultant, having worked previously as a Senior Research Fellow in the Department of Dermatology and Wound Healing at Cardiff University. Dr Clark was Clinical and Marketing Director of Pegasus Airwave Ltd from 1993-1997, and Manager of the Centres of Excellence for Technology and Industrial Collaboration from 2004-2008. He is Chief Executive of the Lindsay Leg Club Foundation and President Elect of the European Pressure Ulcer Advisory Panel. He was Editor-in-Chief of the Journal of Tissue Viability for ten years. He is a past Council member of the European Wound Management Association and previously served as Senior Consultant to the US National Pressure Ulcer Advisory Panel.

Dr Shelley Crawford PhD, BSc (Hons) Occupational Therapy

Shelley is a Lead OT in the Mater Hospital, Belfast Health and Social Services Trust. She specialises in complex seating, postural management and pressure care. Shelley is currently involved in both local and regional groups in the area of complex seating and delivers regional and national seating and postural management courses for OTs and Physiotherapists. Shelley has been a guest reviewer for a number of national and international guidelines in her field of expertise and has a number of journal publications, international conference presentations and a book chapter. She is also a guest lecturer at Queens University and the University of Ulster.

Dr Jeannie Donnelly PhD, BSc (Hons) Health Studies, RGN

Jeannie is the Lead Nurse in Tissue Viability in the Belfast Health and Social Services Trust. She is also a Teaching Fellow Assistant at Queen's University Belfast. Jeannie has fifteen years of clinical and research experience in pressure ulcer prevention and management, and has particular expertise in heel pressure ulcer prevention. She has taught at Queen's University, Belfast and currently runs post-graduate courses for occupational therapists and physiotherapists, focusing on the prevention and management of pressure ulceration. Lorna has acted as a guest reviewer of national guidelines and has published within nursing literature.

Dr May Stinson PhD, MSc, BSc (Hons) Biochemistry, BSc (Hons) Occupational Therapy

May is a lecturer in Occupational Therapy at the University of Ulster. She has over ten years experience in seating and pressure care research, investigating the use and clinical application of pressure mapping systems in pressure ulcer prevention. Her research has resulted in a number of journal publications, a book chapter and international conference presentations.
